Reflection From Our Director

This year has been a year of many changes. As things seemed to steady after a crazy number of years, we've also taken the time to reflect on how library patrons use our spaces as well as tracking how well the materials we offer are being used. We no longer get as many patrons interested in spending twenty minutes browsing the stacks to find their next read, they use our online catalog and our new *library app* (search for Alamance in your app store!) and place items on hold.

Since we also added **24/7 Pick-Up** lockers outside the Graham Public Library, we have expanded our access to those unable to get to the library during operating hours and provide more flexibility to those still weary of contact with others.

Our busy year resulted in *over 300,000 library visitors* and *almost 500,000 items checked out*. We saw a massive increase in our electronic materials being utilized, with the total annual checkouts on Libby and Hoopla jumping from 43,282 in 2021-2022 to 89,258 in 2022-2023, a 200% increase. Which shows that even though people are returning to use our physical space, they are also increasingly utilizing our downloadable and online resources as well.

Summer Reading also showed that our community is definitely interested in getting out and about again. In the two months of our annual Summer Reading program, we promoted Find Your Voice with 1,189 participants reading over 431,487 minutes and 80 programs attended by 1,560 participants. This is just a small part of the overall programs for the entire fiscal year though. Our full-time staff of 31 were able to offer **835 programs** throughout the year, for those from birth to death, and welcomed **31,909 attendees** to those programs.

We pride ourselves on being able to adapt our services in response to the community's needs and had this year **37,794 computer users** and **31,010 wi-fi users**. We also lent out wi-fi **hotspots 120 times** during the year. As we have seen an increase in the number of people interested in utilizing devices at private tables, we are beginning to add the option of checking out Chromebooks for inhouse use, which we foresee as being a testing ground for the possibility of checking them out for take-home use.

We are proud of the opportunity we had to host Governor Cooper at the Mebane Public Library for an announcement awarding funding to expand connectivity to the Alamance County Community. And are excited to have the opportunity to repair and expand our facilities and services due to special monies from the State for libraries in response to problems identified during COVID and will continue to work on these projects moving into the future. Things are changing at the libraries and we hope our community returns to find our spaces more welcoming and ready to help every day!

May Memorial Library Alamance County Public Libraries



The first public library serving Burlington was located in Broad Street High School in the early 1920s. By 1937, the public library had moved to temporary quarters in a storefront located on Main Street. In 1938, industrialist W.H. May, Sr. and his two sons donated \$15,000 towards the purchase of the old U.S. Post Office for use as a public library. This building was constructed in 1918 and stands at the corner of E. Davis and S. Spring Street.

May Memorial Library opened for business on June 2, 1938. At that time, only the main floor fronting on S. Spring St. was in use. In 1945, a Seth Thomas grandfather clock was donated to the library by Col. Eugene Holt, grandson of textile magnate E.M. Holt. It quickly became a much-beloved symbol of the library within the community. In 1955, the basement floor with an entrance on E. Davis Street was remodeled and opened to the public.

By the 1960s, Alamance and Chatham counties had signed a formal cooperation agreement to become the Central N.C. Regional Library with May Memorial Library as its headquarters. In 1981 a new library wing with approximately 4,600 square feet of additional space on the main floor was opened and the basement and second floor of the library were given over to staff work areas. In the late 1990s, local textile CEO Allen Gant, Jr. of Glen Raven, Inc. offered an adjacent building, the former Sears Department Store, to the City of Burlington to expand the public library. The original 1918 building and 1981 addition were linked as one wing with the 1950s Sears building as the other wing connected by a vaulted ceiling entryway and officially opened November 17, 2000.

Graham Public Library Alamance County Public Libraries

The opening of the Graham Public Library as an extension of the May Memorial Library was the highlight of library service in 1967 in Alamance County. Through a partnership with the City of Graham and the board of the May Memorial Library, the Graham Public Library opened in September 1967 in the Graham City Hall as a 3,000 square foot facility with more than 5,000 books. In 1969, the Stokes family was commemorated for the monetary gift made by the Stokes children in honor of Mr. and Mrs. William T. Stokes, which made the Graham Library possible.

In 1994, a two million dollar project was approved to construct, equip and furnish two new Graham facilities: the Graham Public Library and the Graham Police Department. Scheduled to be completed in 240 days, both buildings were placed south of the municipal building; the police department off of Maple Street and the library off of Main Street. The new 10,500 square foot library, which is more than three times the size of the original library, opened its doors on Monday, July 31, 1995.




In 1935 the idea that started the Mebane Public Library began with a local literary club, the Reviewers. Through their efforts in recruiting support and funds, the small beginning of the Mebane Public Library was made possible by Mr. E. M. Yoder, Principal of the Mebane Public School in 1936. Members of the Reviewers Club served as library clerks in the small room in the school. The official Mebane Public Library opened in December 1936 in the Commerical & Farmer's Bank Building, situated at the corner of Clay and North Fourth Streets.

In the Fall of 1941, the building owners offered to sell the building to the City of Mebane for the permanent home of the library. Through the efforts of local civic club fundraising, the building was purchased without the use of any tax payer funds. In 1975, the library moved into a 5,000 square foot space in the back of the Mebane Town Hall.

By the late 1990s, the windowless space at the Mebane City Hall had become cramped and library use had outgrown the space. In the early 2000s the idea to refurbish a vacant mill building revitalized the community. Built in 1919 as Durham Hosiery and changing hands over the years to become Dixie Yarns in the 30s and R.L. Stowe Mills until 2001, the renovated space offered three times the capacity for the new Mebane Public Library and opened its doors on November 7, 2005.

North Park Library Alamance County Public Libraries



The North Park Community Center was built by the City of Burlington in 1978 with funds from the federal Housing and Community Development Act. Initial partnering organizations operating part-time from the new facility included the Burlington Police Department's Crime Prevention Bureau, the Alamance-Caswell Area Mental Association, the Alamance County Health Department and the N.C. Central Regional Library.

On May 15, the North Park Library opened in a small room (approximately 300 square feet) of the community center and offered 'listening posts,' special programs, a story hour and a small collection of books and materials.

As popularity grew, a meeting room space was added to the library's availability, doubling the size to approximately 600 square feet. This allowed for more materials and the eventual addition of public computer space. In 2015, the City of Burlington began renovation projects in North Park. Early efforts provided new carpet and a reorganization of resources. Later efforts included a brand new entrance within the atrium of the community center.

MOBILE LIBRARY

Alamance County Public Libraries

In 1938, a county bookmobile began its service in Alamance. Carrying 400 books in a converted light-delivery truck, a three-week rotation of deliveries was established.

By 1951, a second vehicle increased capacity to 1,600 books and records, making deliveries to 83 stops every two weeks. The next thirty years of continuous bookmobile service continued to grow and thrive in Alamance County until the last vehicle couldn't be replaced in the late 70s/early 80s.

In 2021, ACPL took possession of our new, high-tech Mobile Library! We then began running a designated route in October 2021, serving over 40 stops on a three-week schedule with appearances at special community events as well!

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24/7 Pick-Up Lockers Available at the May Memorial Library.



24\7 Pick-Up Lockers began their operations in August 2022. Made possible by a Library Services and Technology Act grant through the State Library, this no contact, easy access locker system allows patrons to pick-up their requested materials with just their library card. Since then, they have been used to pick up over 5,000 items during the fiscal year for anyone unable to make it into a library during operating hours to get their requested library materials.





While we're not quite back to pre-COVID numbers, seeing an increase to 301,429 library visitors is a vast improvement since the onset of COVID. Although it has not been a quick recovery from the pandemic, the increase across all statistics represents the significant impact libraries make on the community as our numbers edge right under the 2019-2020 totals.



Computers & Technology

ACPL is proud to offer access to public computers during all operating hours. Wi-fi is available 24/7. We offer 20 hotspots on a twenty-eight day check-out for anyone unable to access the Internet from their homes. We also provide printing (both in-house and from mobile devices), faxing, scanning and copying services. This year we worked to begin offering Chromebooks for in-house use.



Through our online databases and NC LIVE, we offer over 120 resources providing online access to complete articles, newspapers, journals, and encyclopedias, and more. All available free of charge to library patrons, both in the library and remotely with your library card. This year's new additions were Chilton Library for car repair and Value Line Online for investment management.
